
The Fine Arts students showcased their talents with an evening presented for Music, Film & Photography, One Act Plays, and Dance. *Well done!*

ATTENDANCE REPORTING SYSTEM

Attendance system, SafeArrival is in use. This includes leaving early and/or lates, vacation, appointments etc.

With **SafeArrival**, you are asked to report your child's absence in advance using any of these 3 convenient methods:

- 1. Using your mobile device, download and install the **SchoolMessenger app** from the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store or **go.schoolmessenger.ca**. The first time you use the app, select **Sign Up** to create your account. You must use the same email address and phone number that is on file at the school. Select **Attendance** then **Report an Absence**.
- 2. Use the SafeArrival website **go.schoolmessenger.ca**. The first time you use the website, select **Sign Up** to create your account. You must use the same email address and phone number that is on file at the school. Select **Attendance** then **Report an Absence**.
- 3. Call the toll-free number 1-833-294-4837 to report an absence using the automated phone system. If you are calling the toll-free number, you must call from the parent/guardian phone number on file with the school.

These options are available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week. We ask that daily absences are reported as soon as possible and before 3:00pm on the day of the absence. This includes late arrivals and early departures and more. Future absences can be reported at any time. If absences are not reported before the cut-off time of 3:00pm, the parent/guardian may still receive an automatic notification in the evening to inform them of an absence. Absences are only to be reported by parents/guardians on file with the school. Students are NOT to report their own absences.

If you report your child's absence in advance using the **SafeArrival** toll-free number, website, or mobile app, you will NOT receive these notifications.

Please report absences using SafeArrival instead of sending notes, calling, or emailing the school. In the morning, the school may receive a high volume of calls. Please use the three options above to report absences. **The school office will no longer accept calls regarding attendance on our main line**. Parents/guardians will need to report via the app, website, or toll-free number in a timely manner.







Children and Youth Can Be Active While School's Out with a Summer Fun Pass Langley, BC – The Summer Fun Pass gives children and youth the opportunity to be active and enjoy unlimited drop-in access to pools, fitness centres, and gymnasiums at Township of Langley recreation facilities throughout the summer. Additionally, children and youth will receive free admission to Family Night and Youth Night events at The Outdoor Experience at Aldergrove Community Centre.

The Summer Fun Pass is available to children (4 to 12 years old) and youth (13 to 18 years old) for a one-time cost of \$25 including tax. The pass is valid from Friday, June 28 to Monday, September 2.

A Summer Fun Pass for children includes:

- swimming pools and public swim sessions, including hot tubs
- drop-in family gymnasium sport sessions
- admission to Family Night events at The Outdoor Experience at Aldergrove Community Centre on Wednesday, July 17 and Wednesday, August 28. Advance online registration required.

A Summer Fun Pass for youth includes:

- swimming pools and public swim sessions including saunas, hot tubs, and steam rooms
- · aquafit classes
- fitness centres with cardio and weight equipment (must be 16+ years old or have completed a youth weight room orientation)
- youth weight room orientation (available to 13 18 year olds and required for 13 15 year olds before using the fitness centre)
- drop-in youth gymnasium sports sessions
- admission to Youth Night events at The Outdoor Experience at Aldergrove Community Centre on Thursday, July 11 and Thursday, August 15. Advance online registration required.

"We're excited to once again offer a discounted recreation pass for summer," says Rob Stare, Township of Langley's Director of Recreation. "And we're thrilled to now make this pass available for both children and youth. We hope that all children and youth will take advantage of the Summer Fun Pass and make good use of our recreation facilities and activities."

The Summer Fun Pass is available for purchase starting Saturday, June 1 and can be bought online by signing into your registration account at tol.ca/recregister and selecting the "Buy a Pass" option. You can also purchase the pass in-person or by phone at Aldergrove Community Centre, George Preston Recreation Centre, Walnut Grove Community Centre, and W.C. Blair Recreation Centre.

Registration is not required for cardio and weight rooms and public swimming sessions. For drop-in activities, online registration opens 23 hours prior to the start of each session and registration is recommended to secure your spot. View and register for activities at tol.ca/recregister.



Information About School Status During Inclement Weather

Snow closures and power outages are an annual occurrence in Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you are able to access the internet via computer or smartphone, current information about Langley schools can be accessed on all school websites or www.sd35.bc.ca. Updates are also posted to Twitter @LangleySchools and Facebook at www.facebook.com/langleyschooldistrict. If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Local radio stations are also informed of school status in Langley. Tune in to CKWX 1130AM, CKNW 980AM, Country Radio 107.1FM, Pulse 107.7 or CBC 690AM or 88.1FM for updates.

Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.

Emergency Procedures & Response

Health and safety are a priority in the Langley School District. Schools follow emergency procedures to ensure students, staff, and any visitors in our schools or sites are safe when unexpected incidents or events happen. At the start of every school year, administrators, teachers, and staff review these emergency procedures. Schools practice a set number of drills annually in preparation for unexpected situations. The district encourages families to become familiar with these staff emergency procedures and the drills that are completed in our schools. You can read them in the Staff Emergency Procedures Poster here or find them posted in areas throughout our buildings. If you have any questions or concerns about emergency procedures, please get in contact with your child's teacher or administrator.

STAFF EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

LOCKDOWN

Used in response to an armed or dangerous assailant WITHIN the school

- ☐ Gather people in your vicinity into a secure room do this quickly
- □ Close and secure doors
- ☐ Turn off lights, be quiet, get down low/behind heavy furniture, get out of sight
- ☐ Silence all cell phones and ask that they be placed face down on floor
- ☐ Alert other occupants by any means available and/or call 911 only if safe to do so OR Leave Safe. If no secure area is available and a safe exit is, then quickly leave the area/school. Report to the designated assembly area and await

*Normal activities in the school cease. Await police response.

HOLD & SECURE

Used if there is a security concern in the neighbourhood

- ☐ Bring everyone into the school and remain inside
- ☐ Secure exterior doors and windows
- ☐ Close exterior window blinds/drapes (if available) ☐ No one may enter or exit the school during Hold & Secure
- *Typically normal activities continue WITHIN the school.

EVACUATE

Used to move people out of the school when a hazard exists inside

- ☐ Direct students and other staff to exit the school via the shortest safe route
- ☐ Report to and assemble outside at the designated assembly site
- *Principal or designate will determine next steps.

SHELTER IN PLACE

Used if an environmental hazard may impact the school ☐ Bring everyone into the school and remain indoors

- □ Secure exterior doors and windows
- ☐ Close exterior window blinds/drapes (if available)
- ☐ Turn off all ventilation systems (if locally available/situation dependent) ☐ Staff designates will monitor access to the school via the main entrance
- ☐ Access may be denied if a risk exists that jeopardizes the safety of occupants
- *Typically normal activities continue WITHIN the school.

ROOM CLEAR

Used to move people away from a hazard contained in one room/area

- ☐ Direct students to leave the room/area and report to designated area (Ex. Library)
- ☐ Summon assistance as needed and appropriate (Ex. call First Aid Attendant, Principal/Vice Principal, 911)
- Staff should remain to manage the situation or exit if the room is unsafe

DROP, COVER & HOLD ON

Used in the event of an earthquake, explosion, or any event that shakes the school

- ☐ Quickly move away from obvious hazards
- □ DROP low to the ground
- ☐ Cover take COVER under a sturdy table, desks, furniture, or other large sturdy
- ☐ HOLD ON to the furniture you are under and stay there until the shaking stops After the shaking stops, wait 60 seconds and then EVACUATE via the shortest safe route. Report to and assemble outside at the designated assembly site.

*Principal or other designate will determine next steps.
